Into the Abyss

Hidden within the Colorado's Flattop Wilderness is Groaning Cave. Composed of 100-million-year-old limestone, these remarkable caverns make up the largest underground system in the state, containing nearly 12 miles of subterranean passages. A winter hibernaculum for area bats and home to a large abundance of extraordinary cave formations, access to Groaning is restricted, and a steel armored gate protects the delicate balance of the fragile ecosystem within. Here's a glimpse into one Colorado's least known treasures.


